SCHAUMBURG APPROVES MASTER PLAN FOR THE DISTRICT

Schaumburg's Village Board unanimously approved a comprehensive development framework for The District at Veridian, which will include more than one million square feet of retail, restaurant, residential and office space making it the largest mixed-use development in the village.

Officials approved the measure at the June 13 Village Board meeting for the land located west of Meacham Road, south of Algonquin Road, and north of Progress Parkway. This dense development is proposed to create a uniquely urban experience, which will provide opportunities for shopping, dining, living and working all within a pedestrian-friendly, walkable neighborhood.

The village has been working to refine the design and layout of this proposed development for The District for the past several years. The area is essentially divided



into four main blocks with additional outlots wrapping around Meacham and Algonquin roads, as well as the center median area on Veridian Boulevard.

The framework plan approves conceptual plans for The District. A more detailed review of individual components of the development will take place at various stages of the project. Construction on the first block is anticipated to begin in 2024.

Regional Airport Terminal Building on June 6, 1998. The airport is home to approximately 90 aircraft and handles about 45,000 operations per year. The airport also generates an annual economic impact of about \$34 million and operates numerous successful businesses that offer flight training, aircraft and helicopter services, and much more. Construction of the terminal building has resulted in the continued success of the airport, the aviation-themed Pilot Pete's restaurant, and the ability to enhance connections with the community through various events such as the Father's Day Pancake Breakfast, Hops and Props in the fall, and Santa's Fly-In in the winter. Experior Transport Groundbreaking

In May, Schaumburg village officials attended the groundbreaking event held for Experior Transport, which is a transport and logistics company that is developing the 55-acre property located at Irving Park and Rodenburg roads. Village President Tom Dailly provided a brief welcome to attendees followed by highlighting the project's many benefits to the community.

Experior plans to construct a 140,000-square-foot corporate headquarters, warehouse space and fueling station in addition to truck parking. The completion of this project is anticipated to result in more than \$40 million being invested into the property as well as 200 new high-paying jobs and annual tax revenue of more than \$425,000 for the Village of Schaumburg and other taxing bodies. Construction is anticipated to be underway soon.

In addition, a new access road and bike path will connect Rodenburg Road to the Schaumburg Metra Station parking lot through a \$1.25 million Rebuild Illinois Regional Economic Development grant from the State of Illinois as part of the project. Check Presented for Schaumburg's First All-Electric Vehicles



Congressman Raja Krishnamoorthi and his staff met with Schaumburg Village President Tom Dailly, village trustees, and others July 10 to present the village with a \$166,000 check in support of the village's proposal to implement an

electric vehicle pilot program. The electric vehicle pilot program helps move forward some of the initiatives and concepts identified in the village's comprehensive green action plan and advances the goals of several federal, state, and local initiatives.

The funding will be used to replace two aging vehicles, a 2013 Dodge Ram and a 2011 Ford F-250 – both of which have internal combustion engines. The vehicles will be replaced with two all-electric Ford E-Transit Cargo Vans. The new vehicles will be used by the village's Building Division, which will allow the village to maximize efficiency of building repairs by being able to store more material in the vehicles and minimize trips. Pilot program funding will also be used to install the charging infrastructure needed for the new vehicles.

Incorporating all-electric vehicles allows the village to lower maintenance and fuel costs, reduce pollutants, collaborate with partners at ComEd and other regional stakeholders, and continue to advance sustainable initiatives.

DRONE PROGRAM

Drones, also known as Small Unmanned Aircraft Systems (sUAS), improve situational awareness and enhance responses to incidents and events. Recently, the police department implemented a drone program. As part of the program, the department established a policy that follows the Illinois Drones as First Responders Act, industry standards and Federal Aviation Administration requirements.

The Illinois Drones as First Responders Act regulates the use of drones by law enforcement in Illinois. This law seeks to protect the privacy of the public while allowing law enforcement to use drones under certain circumstances. As part of the program, the police department purchased two drones that can be used to:

- Assist with crime scene and traffic crash documentation
- Aid in the search and rescue of missing persons
- Assist with dispatched calls for service to coordinate the response of emergency vehicles and personnel
- Provide real-time information and monitor participant safety during special events
- Aid in assessing a natural disaster or a public health emergency

The department's drone operators must successfully pass the Federal Aviation Administration Part 107 Remote Pilot License examination and are subject to the Schaumburg Police Department's sUAS policy. Fall Citizen Police Academy



The fall session of the Schaumburg Police Department's Citizen Police Academy (CPA) begins Wednesday, Sept. 6. The CPA provides the opportunity for members of the community to meet and interact with members of the Schaumburg Police Department on a personal level.

Typically, two sessions are held each year – one in the spring and one in the fall. Each CPA session meets once a week for 10 weeks with classes held from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. on Wednesday evenings. Participants must attend 75% of the sessions to be eligible for graduation and to join the Citizen Police Academy Alumni Association of Schaumburg. Schaumburg residents and employees of Schaumburg businesses, ages 18 and older, are eligible to participate. Fall Citizen Police Academy interactive sessions offer an inside look at how the police department functions. Highlights include a patrol ride-along with an on-duty officer, mock traffic stops, and the opportunity to ask questions of police personnel. New Fire Engine

The Schaumburg Fire Department recently took delivery of a new fire engine on June 8. The new engine sports a hydraulic ladder rack allowing for more compartment space to accommodate additional tools and equipment. It also has a lower hose bed, making

the process for deploying hose safer and faster for firefighters. Lastly, a new lighting package was installed to increase visibility while responding to emergency calls. This should reduce distraction and visual obstruction for drivers, ultimately making it safer for the firefighters by minimizing the chance of an accident.

This past May, members of the Fire Department and Fleet Services traveled to Appleton, WI, to conduct a thorough inspection of the vehicle to ensure it was built to village specifications. Building the apparatus took 18 months. This engine represents the 10th apparatus purchased from Pierce Manufacturing, one of the leaders in the fire apparatus manufacturing industry.

Once fully outfitted with hose, tools, and communications equipment, this new engine will be assigned to Station 51 on Schaumburg Road replacing a 15-year-old engine of a similar build. The current Engine 51 will be refurbished to significantly extend its life. Then the apparatus will be placed into a reserve status, meaning it will be used when a frontline engine breaks down or is scheduled for maintenance. Commercial Motor Vehicle Traffic

Although the summer construction season is winding down, there continues to be a large amount of commercial motor vehicle (CMV) traffic in the Village of Schaumburg. Per village ordinances, most Schaumburg roadways are limited to a maximum of five tons or 10,000 pounds. Residential streets have a posted traffic sign indicating that vehicles exceeding the weight limit are prohibited from driving on the roadway. These signs only restrict vehicles over 10,000 pounds from using the street as a cut-through to another street. Trucks may still use weight-restricted roadways if they have a destination on that street or if that street is the only way to gain access to their destination.

If you see a CMV driving down a residential street and wish to report it to the Schaumburg Police Department, please try to obtain the license plate number of the vehicle and the truck number for easier follow-up. If your complaint about CMVs requires immediate attention, please dial 911. If your complaint involves an ongoing problem or you have general questions, please contact the non-emergency line at (847) 882-3586 and ask to speak to a Traffic Unit representative. Additionally, when driving around CMVs, remember to never tailgate, pass a truck on the right, or try to beat the truck. Always let the truck pass, assume the truck is carrying a full load (and takes longer to stop), and use your turn signal. For questions, contact Sgt. FIRE DEPARTMENT NEW CANDIDATE TRAINING

This year, the Schaumburg Fire Department (SFD) has welcomed 10 new candidates. As part of the onboarding process, all 10 candidates participated in two weeks of day shifts which began the day after they were sworn in. During this time, candidates rotated through each of Schaumburg's five stations to learn the basic skills associated with each company and apparatus as well as daily routines and expectations of company officers. Additionally, they took part in orientations with all three chiefs, the department's Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Coordinator and the department's Training Division. On the final day of onboarding, candidates visited Station 51 and participated in an auto extrication drill. Additional time has been spent at Elk Grove's Training Tower where the candidates practiced live fire training and engine operations.

Over the course of the next year, each candidate will work on completing their candidate task book, which highlights specific fire and EMS-related skills and quarterly exams that must be completed and passed before their candidacy period ends. During this time, some candidates will also attend the fire academy in Romeoville and begin paramedic school through Harper College to satisfy additional department requirements.

FIRE PIT AND ASH DISPOSAL SAFETY

With fall weather approaching, many people turn to fire pits or outdoor fireplaces for extra warmth at outdoor gatherings. Just as with fireplaces in the home, there are key things one must do to ensure safety before and after use:

- Inspect the fire pit. To prevent unwanted fire spread, make sure there are no loose bricks, cracks in masonry pits or rusted holes in premanufactured pits.
- Only burn firewood. Branches you just trimmed, old paperwork/ mail or left-over construction material is not meant for firepits or outdoor fireplaces. These products produce a lot of smoke, potential toxic gases as well as possible large embers that will rise and land in areas you might not want them to, such as your or your neighbor's roof.
- Be ready to extinguish the fire. Keep a proper fire extinguisher nearby or ensure quick access to your garden hose.
- Practice proper ash disposal. When disposing of fire pit or charcoal ash, you first must wait until it is cool enough to handle. While water will help cool the ash, it can also cause damage to some fire pits or outdoor fireplaces by cooling the metal or masonry too fast. After cooling, place the ash in a metal receptacle that has a lid until it is time for disposal with other household garbage. Last year, about 25% of all residential fires in Schaumburg were due to improper disposal of ashes and similar materials.



As a reminder, a permit is required if you are considering installing a permanent fire pit or outdoor fireplace in Schaumburg. National Parkway Reconstruction

National Parkway is closed to through traffic from Golf Road through American Lane as the roadway reconstruction project continues. 

Pace Breaks Ground on Improvements to Northwest Transportation Center

Schaumburg elected officials joined Pace leaders, state representatives, local officials, and others at a ceremony held July 19 to break ground on a new ADA Transfer Facility adjacent to the Northwest Transportation Center. The project, which is being funded by Rebuild Illinois funding, will transform a critical hub for paratransit with new assets that promote accessibility, expand capacity, and enhance comfort and aesthetics for people with disabilities and other commuters. Improvements to the site include the demolition of the former Schaumburg Post Office and the renovation of an existing facility that will accommodate customers, for the first time, with indoor waiting area and public restrooms.

The Pace Northwest Transportation
Center is a major hub with over 1,000
daily boardings for Pace service, including
I-90 Express buses which utilize the
Illinois Tollway I-90 Flex Lanes to bypass



congestion and connect commuters to the CTA Blue Line at Rosemont. The new transit center and ADA Transfer Facility will include two new dual-port car charging stations, with capacity for four electric cars, an expanded drop-off area, and new Pace branded signs with real-time bus departure information. New sidewalks will provide pedestrian access from Mall Drive and Kimberly Drive to the bus terminal, and parking capacity will increase from 192 spaces (6 ADA) to 301 spaces (8 ADA) to support the popular I-90 Express services. Other improvements include landscaping and site furnishings, seating, Ventra ticketing, and digital and audio bus arrival information. Fall Cost Share Reforestation Program

The Village of Schaumburg will continue the process of replacing ash trees through its ongoing cost share reforestation planting program this fall. The village is offering a cost share option to any resident who wishes to have their tree planted sooner than what is otherwise scheduled. To take advantage of this program, participants should create a Customer Service Request or dial 311 in Schaumburg to request participation in the fall 2023 program. The resident shall pay a percentage of the replacement cost for an approximately 2-inch diameter tree.

Participants will receive a letter requesting their first and second selections when ordering trees to increase the chances that a tree of their choice will be available. Mailbox Maintenance

Now is the perfect time to maintain your mailbox before the grip of winter. As a reminder, maintenance of mailboxes is the responsibility of the property owner and the care of your mailbox should be an annual part of your property maintenance. Please review the following:

- Ensure that your mailbox complies with village regulations. The face of the mailbox should be 12 inches behind the back of the curb to allow snowplows to pass without contacting the mailbox. If your mailbox is not 12 inches behind the back of the curb, please consider relocating it.
- Check that your post and arm are secure and solid enough to take the weight of snow coming off a snowplow. If your post is not secure, please make the necessary repairs that will allow your mailbox to last through the winter months.
- Confirm that the mailbox door and signal flag function properly and that there are no sharp edges on the mailbox.

FALL LEAF SWEEPING

This fall, the village's Engineering and Public Works Department will be removing leaves in the neighborhood that have fallen into the streets. This important program is designed to remove naturally deposited leaves from curbs and gutters before they accumulate on storm sewer inlets, which if not removed could potentially increase the risk of street flooding. Residents should not take leaves from their yards and move them into the street for pick up by the street cleaning equipment. Garbage Collection Day Reminders

Residents are reminded that garbage, recycling and landscape waste shall be placed curbside on the day of collection no later than 7 a.m. and may be placed the day prior to collection according to these seasonal requirements:

- After 6 p.m. from April 1 through Sept. 30
- After 4 p.m. from Oct. 1 through March 31

When putting carts out at the curb, handles should be facing the property with the lid opening toward the street. Arrows are marked on the lid of the cart to remind residents which way the cart should face to ensure Lakeshore Recycling Systems' trucks can easily pick up the carts to dispose of its contents. SCHAUMBURG STORY: ISABELLA OCAMPO

Celebrating Schaumburg's diversity and recognizing residents who give back to the community.

Q: Tell us about yourself.

A: I will be a senior at Hoffman Estates High School this fall and have lived in Schaumburg since I was in elementary school. I speak Spanish fluently and was taught by my parents at home. When it came time for me to go to school, I was enrolled in English as a Second Language (ESL) classes. I also started taking Spanish classes in middle school to further advance my language skills. I love speaking Spanish because it makes me feel more connected to my Hispanic community and my identity as a Latina woman. I also regularly communicate in Spanish with my family in Mexico. My parents are from the town of Tilzapotla and the city of Cuernavaca, both located in the Mexican state of Morelos.

This year, I was eligible to participate in the Spanish exchange program. In December, I started communicating with a Spanish exchange student, Gabriel, and hosted him in my family's home for two weeks. It was eye-opening to experience cultures and customs other than my own. Earlier this year, I had the opportunity to go to Spain, be hosted by an exchange family, and visit Barcelona and Madrid.



Q: How do you give back to the community?

A: Over the last several years, I have signed up for many volunteer opportunities in the community, including visiting young children in hospitals and seniors in retirement homes. During the last school year, I accumulated approximately 100 hours of community service hours alone. Some places I volunteer include the Schaumburg Township District Library, Feed My Starving Children, Hoffman Estates High School events and clubs, Woodfield Area Children's Organization and the Special Olympics. Earlier this year, I helped one of my school clubs make "Hawk Kits" for the homeless in Chicago. Hygiene products (shampoo, pads, conditioner, lotion, deodorant, etc.) are placed in a bag branded with our school mascot, the hawk. There are many volunteer opportunities for teens like me to participate in the Schaumburg community.
