MAYOR HOLDS ANNUAL STATE OF THE VILLAGE ADDRESS

Schaumburg Village President Tom Dailly held his annual State of the Village address at the Good Morning Schaumburg breakfast hosted by the Schaumburg Business Association (SBA) on Jan. 9. Approximately 150 people attended the event that was held at the Schaumburg Convention Center. President Dailly discussed Schaumburg's successes in 2023, including continued progress at 90 North, project developments, new business openings, and a preview of additional investments and enhancements coming to Schaumburg. Below are some highlights shared with the audience:

- Phase I construction of the Entertainment District near the Schaumburg Convention Center is poised to begin. This includes development of Andretti Indoor Karting & Games and a 900-space parking structure as well as a future entertainment user and restaurant.
- Phase II work on the 90 North District Park is set to begin and will
 include work on two distinct areas: a Water Feature Plaza and a Tilted
 Lawn Zone. This will also coincide with construction of the new Shared
 Street that will define the western boundary of the park.
- Construction is anticipated to begin on HopScotch, a British pub-style restaurant, that will be located in Town Square.



Plans are being submitted to reimagine the demolished Macy's
 Furniture Gallery space at the northwest corner of Meacham and Golf
 roads in what will be called Crossroads of Schaumburg. Plans include a
 new 5-building development of restaurants and retail for that location.

Capital Improvement Plan Approved



The Village Board approved the \$224 million multi-year Capital Improvement Plan at its Jan. 9 meeting. The Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) is a comprehensive plan that sets the direction and priorities for the village's capital improvement projects and associated funding for the next five years.

The CIP is updated annually and represents the village's commitment to sustaining its roadways, infrastructure, and community facilities.

The plan anticipates spending approximately \$8 million annually to improve residential streets, which will allow the village to meet a prior-established goal to lower the number of local streets in need of reconstruction to 5% or less by 2025. In addition to street improvements, the plan supports water, storm sewer, sanitary sewer, and utility improvements, the redevelopment of the 90 North District, walking and biking trail improvements, and more.

VILLAGE ENSURES BACK-UP WATER SUPPLY THROUGH AGREEMENT

To ensure a continuous, safe water supply to residents, the Schaumburg Village Board recently approved an extension of an intergovernmental emergency interconnection agreement with the DuPage Water Commission (DWC) to ensure a back-up water supply to the village should it be needed. The agreement will be in effect through 2049.

The village obtains its drinking water from the North Suburban Municipal Joint Action Water Agency (NSMJAWA). The DWC-

Schaumburg interconnection, which serves as a back-up water supply, is located in Roselle and is comprised of a water main that is more than sufficient to meet the village's average daily demand. The village has relied on the DWC for water several times in the past through the current agreement. New Online Transfer Stamp Portal

In January, the village introduced a new, online Transfer Stamp Portal to modernize and streamline the real estate transfer tax stamp application process. On transfers of real estate titles, a tax is collected, and a transfer stamp is issued. Previously, requests for transfer stamps were done by mail, in person, or by email, and a physical stamp was issued. With the new online portal, applicants are now able to submit application documents, read comments regarding the application from village staff, make payments, and revisit past applications. Users can also view the status of their transfer stamp application within the portal by entering the tracking number provided in the application submission email receipt. Once an application is paid, the transfer stamp will be issued digitally, eliminating the fees associated with mail carriers and the need for customers to pick up a physical stamp in person.

WINTRUST FIELD TO UNDERGO RENOVATIONS



Recently, the Village Board approved a series of improvements that will be made to Wintrust Field in time for the Schaumburg Boomers' upcoming season. These enhancements aim to elevate the overall fan experience and provide a more comfortable and enjoyable atmosphere during games.

One major upgrade involves the installation of concrete slabs at the lawn area along the third baseline. This enhancement will prevent the accumulation of mud and prevent other issues that come with inclement weather. Additionally, the electrical capacity will be increased to allow for more portable concessions to be conveniently placed near the tents.

A complete remodel of the left field party deck is planned. The current three-tiered deck with bleachers will evolve into a two-tiered deck featuring a bar rail and freestanding tables with additional seating. A canvas and steel canopy system will be implemented to provide shade, creating a more inviting and comfortable environment throughout the summer months.

Last year, the Board approved additional outdoor suites and drink rails situated at the top of the seating area. Railings will distinguish the private group seating areas from public areas, ensuring an exclusive setting for groups.

In addition to improvements being made by the village, the Boomers have several fan experience enhancements scheduled, including a new kids zone with several new inflatables, updated picnic and outdoor suite areas, fully renovated suites, a suite-level dessert bar, a new suite commercial video system, and significant improvements to the Schaumburg Club meeting room for both in-game and outside events.

2024 BRUSH COLLECTION PROGRAM

The village's 2024 brush collection program will begin at the end of April and will offer two collection cycles for each zone until the program ends in September. The collection zones are rotated in the pickup schedule each year.

Residents can follow the collection schedule listed below and on the village's website at www.schaumburg.com/brush; no appointments are necessary. This program is open to single family residences only; contractor-generated brush will not be collected.


Brush must be placed at the curb by 7 a.m. on the Monday of your scheduled week. It may take crews up to five days to complete collection in each zone. Please note that no brush will be collected on Monday, May 27 due to the Memorial Day holiday. Collection will begin for that week on Tuesday, May 28.

Branches cannot have root material attached and are to be neatly placed curbside with the cut ends toward the street. Unorganized

or tangled brush piles will not be collected. Residents are asked to follow the brush preparation guidelines listed on the village's website to ensure their material is collected as part of the program. For more information, contact Laurie Walter at <a href="https://www.lwalter.google.goo

Yard waste pickup will resume the first week of April and materials should be placed out on your regular garbage collection day. Smaller brush and yard waste can be placed into biodegradable bags not to exceed 30 gallons in capacity or 50 pounds in weight. Larger brush piles must be bundled using garden string or twine.

An Inside Look at Fire Department Training Efforts

When members of the Schaumburg Fire Department are not responding to calls, they are busy training. A key foundation of fire department training is getting out and honing skills in the community. Last year, fire personnel completed more than 50,000 hours of training. This number includes time spent in the classroom, conducting company training in the field, and participating in annual required training.

Crews regularly visit businesses, apartment complexes, office buildings, commercial buildings, and local neighborhoods to review building construction, response routes and possible hazards. If you notice personnel walking through your business, they are likely preplanning. Preplanning allows crews to see the layout of a building, note important construction features and make plans in the case of a fire. Another effective training method involves using acquired structures scheduled to be torn down or undergo a complete remodel. Generous business/property owners often allow the fire department to use their structure, providing a realistic environment for firefighters to simulate various emergency scenarios that allow them to practice techniques and other critical firefighting skills.

Regular training prepares fire personnel for a wide range of emergencies, helps mitigate risks, and fosters collaboration with other agencies. A well-trained and equipped firefighting force is essential for safeguarding lives, property, and the overall well-being of a community.

Lithium-Ion Battery Safety

Did you know rechargeable lithium-ion batteries power many household items? While these batteries are generally safe and efficient power sources for toys, scooters, or tools, it is crucial to follow safety guidelines to prevent potential fire hazards.

Lithium-ion batteries can store significant amounts of electricity, which can generate substantial heat during use or charging. Take proper precautions to ensure safety. If the battery sustains damage, avoid charging or using it, as the heat release could lead to a fire, not only affecting the battery but also posing a risk to the device it powers and nearby items. In extreme cases, the battery may even explode violently.

When charging, use only approved and product-listed chargers to minimize risks. Many aftermarket chargers lack essential safety features that can halt charging if issues are detected. Additionally, once the battery is fully charged, promptly disconnect the charger. This practice not only prolongs the battery's lifespan but also reduces the risk of potential fires caused by unseen damage to the battery.

Proper disposal of lithium-ion batteries is also important. Avoid placing them in regular garbage, as they can continue to discharge and generate heat, posing a fire risk. Numerous manufacturers of battery-powered devices offer recycling programs, providing free shipping labels for battery returns. Alternatively, consider using Call2Recycle bins at local retailers or designated battery recycling centers.

ECOLOGICAL RESTORATION PROJECT UNDERWAY

In December, restoration work began in the natural area south of the Municipal Center grounds. This three-year restoration project will expand the existing managed natural area and will improve the site for native animals and Schaumburg residents alike.

Landscape Division employee, Kyle Clifton, identified that the south woodland native area needed attention and led the push for its restoration. This project is managed by the village's natural areas contractor, Tall Grass, and is partially funded through a ComEd Green Region grant, which focuses on encouraging natural pollinators. The first year of this project includes removing undesirable and exotic invasive plant species from the area. The following year, native plants and seeds will be added. When left unmanaged, exotic invasive species can out-compete native ones and take up space that native plants use. Wildlife in the area depends on native species and will greatly benefit from the promotion of native plant growth. With the planned addition of a walking trail through this natural area, residents will also be able to enjoy this newly restored natural space.

National Parkway Reconstruction


Enhanced Water Billing FAQs Webpage
