## Schaumburg Fire Department Receives ISO Class 1 Rating

For the first time in its history, the Schaumburg Fire Department was recently awarded the Insurance Services Office (ISO) Class 1 Public Protection Classification (PPC) rating, the highest that can be achieved. This classification demonstrates the department's ability to provide the best in emergency response and community risk reduction.

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The Schaumburg Fire Department joins 28 other communities in Illinois that have an ISO 1 rating. Schaumburg is also one of six communities in Illinois and joins 124 communities in the United States that have both an ISO 1 rating and have achieved accreditation status with the Commission on Fire Accreditation International (CFAI). Accredited agencies are often described as being community-focused, data-driven, outcome-focused, strategic-minded, well organized, properly equipped, and properly staffed and trained.

ISO provides statistical information on risk and classifies communities on a scale ranging from 1 to 10, with 1 being the top rating. To earn an ISO 1 rating, communities are required to demonstrate their capabilities for water distribution, fire department equipment, fire department staffing, training, public education, fire/building codes, and fire notification (dispatch) facilities.

To achieve the ISO 1 rating, the fire department made several improvements that included enhancing documentation of all training activity, increasing its live fire training, completing pre-response plans for all commercial and industrial buildings, and reassigning a ladder truck from Station 53 to 51 for better aerial ladder coverage, among others.

The fire department also worked with other departments to improve overall service capabilities. The village's water model report was updated with Engineering & Public Works to identify potential water flow deficiencies. ISO also reviewed how public safety personnel are dispatched for emergencies as part of its review process.

# REMEMBERING MAYOR AL LARSON: 1938-2024 A LEGACY OF VISIONARY LEADERSHIP



The Village of Schaumburg's longest-serving former Village President Al Larson, passed away on March 19, 2024, at the age of 85. Larson's dedication and visionary leadership have left a lasting mark in the community.

Serving as the village's mayor for an unprecedented 32 years, from 1987 to 2019, and as a trustee for 12 years prior, Larson's commitment to Schaumburg's growth and prosperity was unwavering. Schaumburg Village President Tom Dailly, who worked alongside Larson for over 25 years, reflected on his mentor's profound impact: "Al Larson instilled in me that Schaumburg should always strive to be more than bricks and mortar, blacktop, and concrete. There is no one who loved this village more than he did, and Al will always be my Mayor of Schaumburg."

Larson's legacy is etched in the fabric of Schaumburg's history. His early initiatives, such as establishing the Olde Schaumburg Centre Historic District and co-founding the Spring Valley Nature Sanctuary, showcased his commitment to preserving the village's heritage and natural beauty.

Throughout his tenure, Larson spearheaded transformative projects that propelled Schaumburg into a vibrant community. From the acquisition of the Schaumburg Airpark (now Schaumburg Regional Airport) to the development of Town Square Shopping Center and the Renaissance Schaumburg Convention Center Hotel, Larson's foresight laid the foundation for economic growth and prosperity. His collaborative spirit was evident in the successful negotiation to bring professional baseball to Schaumburg, resulting in the construction of a baseball field, now known as Wintrust Field, a beloved community asset.

His dedication to the arts was recognized with the renaming of the Prairie Center for the Arts in his honor in 2017.

Even in retirement, Larson remained committed to serving Schaumburg, contributing his expertise to various boards and



commissions. His philanthropic endeavors, such as funding the Prairie Center Arts Foundation's Young Artist Assistance Program, exemplify his enduring legacy of support for the community's youth.

Al Larson's impact transcends generations, shaping the past, present and future of Schaumburg. As we bid farewell to a visionary leader, we carry forward his legacy of passion, dedication and service, ensuring that Schaumburg continues to thrive for years to come.

# Police Department Receives Reaccreditation

The Schaumburg Police Department was recently awarded its 11th national accreditation by the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc. (CALEA®) in the Law Enforcement program for continuing to meet the highest professional standards of public safety. The purpose of CALEA's accreditation programs is to improve the delivery of public safety services, primarily by



maintaining a body of standards, developed by public safety practitioners, covering a wide range of up-to-date public safety initiatives; establishing and administering an accreditation process; and recognizing professional excellence. The Schaumburg Police Department was initially accredited in 1986 and was the first in the State of Illinois to earn the distinction.

The accreditation process includes public safety agencies that voluntarily demonstrate how they meet professionally recognized criteria for excellence in management and service delivery. The Schaumburg Police Department underwent a rigorous self-assessment and meticulous site-based assessment of policies, practices and processes against internationally accepted standards by independent assessors. Public feedback was collected to promote community trust and engagement, and structured interviews were conducted with members of the department to assess the agency's effectiveness and overall service delivery capacities. The Village of Schaumburg's Fiscal Year (FY) 2024/25 Annual Budget was approved on April 23. This year's budget anticipates an easing of inflationary economic conditions and moderating revenue growth while presenting a balanced budget with an expected \$3.2 million surplus ensuring efficient municipal services, fiscal responsibility, and proactive leadership.

The FY 24/25 budget has projected total revenues and other financing sources of \$344.4 million and total expenditures and other financing uses of \$341.2 million for the fiscal year that began May 1, 2024, and ends April 30, 2025.

Despite increases in expenditures by public safety pension obligations, personnel costs, and supply and service costs, the FY 24/25 budget includes several initiatives that were deemed priorities based on feedback received from the 2021 National Community Survey. Resulting priorities include promoting economic development; investing in infrastructure; promoting inclusion; easing the cost of living; and ensuring public health and safety. The FY 24/25 budget includes funding to conduct the survey again in late 2024 to obtain updated feedback from the community that will guide future village priorities.

## State Grocery Tax Proposal

Schaumburg elected officials are voicing strong opposition to Illinois Gov. JB Pritzker's proposal to eliminate the state's current 1% sales tax on food, drugs, and medical appliances – a measure that would result in an estimated decrease of \$3.4 million in annual revenues for Schaumburg.

Revenues from the 1% grocery tax are dedicated solely to municipal governments. The decrease in revenue would limit Schaumburg's ability to maintain and improve essential infrastructure, provide quality public services, and support vital community programs.

In addition to leveraging grant opportunities for several projects to reduce the burden on local taxpayers, other projects highlighted in the budget include:

- Establishing a TIF District for the area in and around the Centex Industrial Park that will include a redevelopment plan to revitalize the area and strengthen the economic base.
- Expansion of permitting software that will continue to streamline the process and enhance transparency for customers.
- Increasing total street sweeping cycles to preserve the aesthetics of the community and protect the health of waterways.
- Continued focus on cultural inclusivity training for employees to provide them with tools and resources to best serve Schaumburg's diverse public.
- Phase II of the Health Services Needs Assessment will provide an action plan for the village, in partnership with community agencies, to enhance public health services.

Local government is already facing financial burdens imposed by large mandates such as public pension contributions and body camera implementation, among others, and elimination of the grocery tax would negatively impact the quality of life for Schaumburg residents.

Residents are encouraged to contact their state legislators and the Governor and urge them to oppose the elimination of the 1% grocery sales tax being proposed in the state budget and maintain critical funding necessary for local government operations. Much of my work experience has been on behalf of counties—including DuPage and McHenry—but I have also had stops at the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and the Regional Transportation Authority of Northeastern Illinois while in graduate school. Most recently, I served as the Senior Transportation Planner in the DuPage County Division of Transportation. In the role, I was the trails coordinator, Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) coordinator, and an unofficial GIS analyst, though I wore many hats. Some of my notable projects include the DuPage Trails Plan and the East Branch of the DuPage River Trail through the Glen Ellyn/Lombard area.

## Engineering & Public Works Department Awarded Project of the Year

The Village of Schaumburg Engineering and Public Works Department recently accepted an American Public Works Association (APWA) Project of the Year Award from the Suburban Branch of the APWA Chicago Metro Chapter. The village's American Lane Culvert Rehabilitation Project won the award in the category of Disaster or Emergency Construction Repair less than \$5 million.

The village recently completed the rehabilitation of the American Lane Culverts. The large diameter storm sewers, originally constructed in the 1970s and 1980s, consisted of metal pipes that were experiencing significant deterioration due to corrosion. The pipes drain 2.4 square miles within the West Branch of the Salt Creek watershed and provide drainage to the businesses along the Golf Road corridor and the Woodfield Lakes Business Park. Several sections of the culverts had partially collapsed, placing at risk upstream drainage areas and the American Lane pavement. Collapsed sections were repaired and the pipes were restored to full capacity by utilizing a sprayed-in-place geopolymer



cementitious lining product. The village rehabilitated the culvert with the assistance of engineering firms Crawford, Murphy & Tilly, Inc. of Aurora, and Chastain & Associates, LLC of Schaumburg, and the construction firm Municipal & Contractors Sealing Products of Cincinnati, Ohio.

Express permits are also available for projects that do not require a plan review. Express permits are limited to the following residential projects: roofing, siding, air conditioners, furnaces, water heaters, sewer repairs, plumbing, some electric work, and temporary storage.

## Schaumburg Continuing New Model Of Providing Counseling Services

For many years, the village offered Schaumburg residents counseling services through its Family Counseling Center (FCC), located at 17 E. Schaumburg Rd. Village staff identified a trend that showed the center was primarily providing services to residents who were insured and could attain therapy services through private practitioners.

In the fall of 2023, the village began a trial period to change the way it provides counseling services to residents in need. Rather than operating similarly to private practices, the village began focusing resources on therapeutic mental health services, specifically for those with a direct connection to police calls for service. The core of this service model allows social service workers to respond, as often as practical, with patrol officers to police calls for service involving individuals with mental health or other crisis-related issues. This approach offers safe and effective de-escalation options, immediate counseling, and therapeutic and resource referral services. It also expedites the process for mental health follow-up, whether that be through continued counseling and therapy with the village's staff or a referral for contracted services.

At its March 12 Village Board meeting, Schaumburg officials approved a measure to permanently close the FCC and continue offering counseling services to clients in need who may be referred by the police department's social services unit. The village will also continue to contract with Owens and Associates for residents who may be uninsured or underinsured and need independent counseling and therapeutic services that would have previously been provided through the FCC.



# PROPER USE OF FIRE EXTINGUISHERS

Before attempting to use a fire extinguisher, it is imperative to dial 911 to ensure backup assistance from the fire department. Next, assess the type of fire and verify that the extinguisher is suitable for the fire encountered. Fire extinguishers are classified into five categories: Class A for ordinary combustibles (wood, paper or cloth), Class B for flammable liquids, Class C for electrical fires, Class D for combustible metals, and Class K for cooking oils. While many extinguishers are labeled as ABC (all-purpose), it is crucial to ensure suitability for specific fire types, such as kitchen fires involving grease or oil. Ensure that you have the proper one in your home or office.

To effectively use a fire extinguisher, follow the PASS acronym: Pull the pin, Aim at the base of the fire (not the flames), Squeeze the handle, and Sweep the nozzle from side to side. Position yourself within five feet of the fire for optimal effectiveness. Visit www.bit.ly/4aDoAhK to view an instructional video on fire extinguisher usage prepared by Consumer Reports. # CLOSE BEFORE YOU DOZE

While Illinois State law mandates smoke alarms in all residential structures, additional precautions can significantly enhance safety in the event of a fire. One such measure is sleeping with bedroom doors closed. This simple barrier keeps smoke, fire, and heat out of the room for an extended period, providing valuable time to react to the smoke detector's sound and find a safe exit path or make the decision to shelter in place until rescue arrives.

Modern home furnishings burn hotter and faster than their predecessors, with temperatures exceeding 1000 degrees at the highest point in a remarkably short time during a fire. Closing bedroom doors

## Vehicle Heat Safety Reminders

It is never safe to leave a toddler, person with disabilities or pet inside a vehicle unattended. Even if the windows are open on warm days, temperatures can become dangerous and deadly in a few minutes. Your convenience is not worth the life of a loved one. Dial 911 to report a person or pet left unattended in a vehicle so public safety personnel can be notified.

Accidental vehicular heatstroke deaths can also occur. If you have toddlers and young children in your household, always lock your vehicles and store the keys out of reach. Children can wander and climb into a vehicle unnoticed. Parents and caregivers are also reminded to make it a habit to look in the back seat every time you exit a vehicle. For questions, contact Ofc. ## **Practice Water Safety**

When the weather gets warmer, people look to stay cool by participating in water activities in pools, lakes and rivers. The Schaumburg Fire Department shares some tips to keep everyone safe when spending time around water.

- Wear a life vest when on a boat or near open water. Life vests offer protection such as added buoyancy during periods of exhaustion. They also help keep people afloat during unexpected medical emergencies.
- Participate in swim lessons to help build confidence in swimmers and learn rescue skills like floating in the event of distress.
- Utilize swim vests and floaties for swimmers who require them. Ensure a strong swimmer or lifeguard is also present in the event of an emergency.
- Make sure home pools have a cover or gate to keep people, children and pets from entering. Be sure to properly maintain pools, including appropriate filter covers to help avoid entrapment and tripping hazards.
- Enforce water safety rules such as no running on wet surfaces.
- Learn CPR and first aid to help provide lifesaving skills before first responders arrive.

# **PEDESTRIAN & DRIVER SAFETY**

Summer brings more pedestrians onto roadways, prompting the Schaumburg Police Department to emphasize shared responsibility for traffic safety among both drivers and pedestrians. Safety is a twoway street and sometimes pedestrians, especially younger ones, may not be where expected. Here are key safety practices for both pedestrians and drivers to follow.



#### Pedestrians:

- **Be visible:** Wear bright or reflective clothing and attempt to establish eye contact with drivers. Never assume a driver sees you.
- Be alert: Your senses are crucial for safety. Avoid distractions and stay focused.
- **Be predictable:** Use crosswalks and sidewalks whenever possible. Enter the crosswalk cautiously. If no crosswalk is available, find a well-lit spot to cross and only do so when it is safe.

#### **Drivers**:

- **Be alert:** Remain vigilant at all times and watch out for pedestrians, particularly during low visibility situations like nighttime or bad weather. Avoid distractions.
- **Be predictable**: Always yield to pedestrians in crosswalks. Slow down and be ready to stop. Never pass another vehicle stopped at a crosswalk; there may be unseen pedestrians.

Both pedestrians and drivers should adhere to traffic regulations, obeying signs and signals. By exercising caution and being aware of your surroundings, the risk of accidents can be significantly reduced. Even if you have the right-of-way, please practice patience with others on the roadway. # **CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS**



## 2024 Street Improvement Program

This year's improvements include 14.6 miles of preventative maintenance, 1.92 miles of corrective resurfacing, 5.68 miles of reconstruction/modified reconstruction, bike path resurfacing/ reconstruction, parking lot improvements, and pedestrian enhancements. ## Water Main Replacement Program

## **Dial-A-Ride Transportation**

Schaumburg's Dial-A-Ride Transportation (DART) provides curb-tocurb service to any location within the village municipal boundary as well as three locations outside the village: Township of Schaumburg, Conant High School and Harper College. Rides must be requested at least 90 minutes in advance, and the fare is \$4. Seniors, persons with disabilities, students up to 12th grade going to and from school, and children ages 7 to 11 are eligible for a reduced fare of \$2. Children under 7 are free if accompanied by an adult. Income-eligible passengers may qualify for free rides. Fares can be paid in cash or by voucher. Vouchers are sold in increments of 10 and available for purchase through the village's website or at the Transportation Department office. In partnership with Pace Suburban Bus Division, DART has provided more than three million rides since its inception in 1979. The service is available to the public and operates Monday through Friday from 6 a.m. through 9 p.m. To schedule a ride using DART, please call (847) 352-8097. ## **Residential Property Inspections Update**

Community Development Department inspectors completed the final phase of walking inspections involved in the systematic residential exterior property maintenance program earlier this year. Most homes were compliant. Inspectors will begin a new round of walking inspections this fall and continue to recheck locations identified with outstanding compliance.

The four-year program began in 2020 and involved inspecting all free-standing single-family homes. Notice letters were mailed to correct maintenance items within a specific time frame, depending on the type of violation(s) identified. Thank you notices were sent to homes that passed an inspection. Property maintenance requirements include items related to the overall condition of the home's exterior and yard, including peeling paint, refuse storage, posting of address numbers, vehicle storage, and walkway/driveway conditions.

Property owners are required to meet village property maintenance codes and regulations to keep Schaumburg looking its best. Regulations are enforced by the village to preserve residential properties, provide a safe environment, and maintain property values. 
